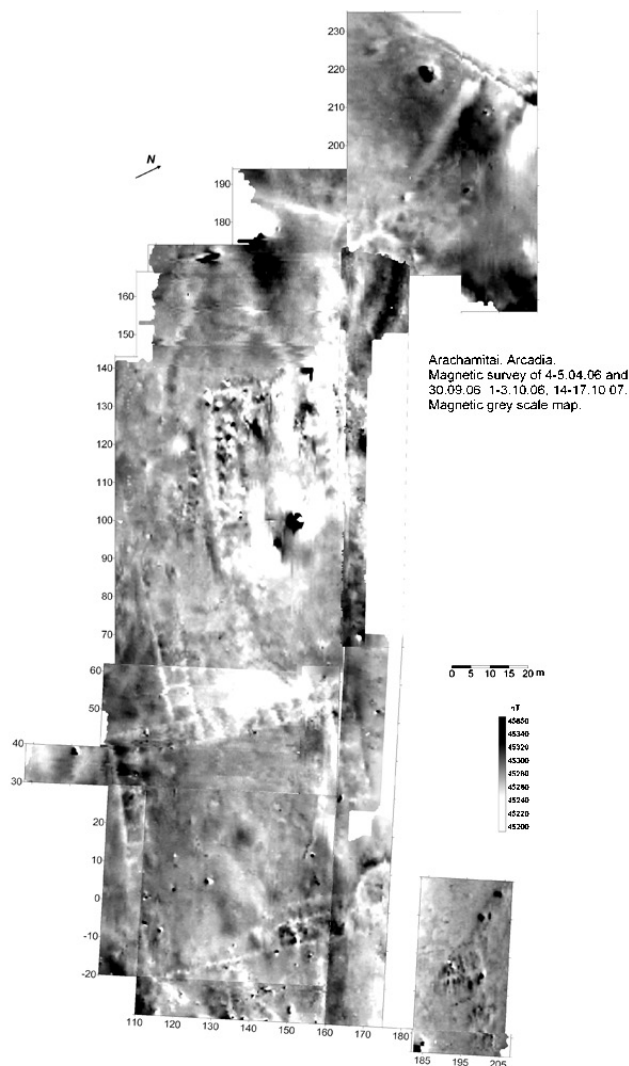

In 2006-2007, a site Agia Paraskevi of Arachamitai, which is located at the highest point of the pass leading from Asea into the valley of Arachamitai, on the central part of Peloponnesus. On the basis of a magnetometer survey and trial excavations this fairly recently found site can tentatively be interpreted as an extra-urban sanctuary with cult activity stretching from the second half of the sixth until the end of the first century BC (Forsén, Tikkala, Smekalova 2008). A stoa-like structure (ca. 30 x 11 m) of Hellenistic date is assumed to belong to the sanctuary, whereas the date and function of another large building (65 x 65 m), which was detected through the magnetometer survey, remains unclear.
